Believe in Me


Movie Review by Belinda Hiemstra

sweet by and by

Sanford Fillmore Bennett was born in Eden, NY on June 21, 1836. He enjoyed writing poetry and had many poems published in the Waukegan, Illinois GazetteIn 1860 he moved to Elkhorn, Wisconsin and became associate editor of the Elkhorn Independent.

When the Civil War broke out, Bennett served with the 40th Wisconsin Volunteers. When he returned to Elkhorn he began running a drugstore and studying medicine. It was in his drugstore that he wrote his one and only hymn. Bennett, himself, recorded the account:

Mr. Webster, like many musicians, was of an exceedingly nervous and sensitive nature; and subject to periods of depression. I had learned his peculiarities so well that on

meeting him I could tell at a glance if he was melancholy, and had found that I could rouse him up by giving him a new song to work on. He came into my place of business, walked down to the stove, and turned his back on me without speaking. I was at my desk. Turning to him, I said, "Webster, what is the matter now?" It's no matter," he replied, "it will be all right by and by."

The idea of the hymn came to me like a flash of sunlight, and I replied, "The Sweet By and By! Why would not that make a good hymn?" "Maybe it would," he said indifferently. Turning to my desk I penned the words of the hymn as fast as I could write. I handed the words to Webster. As he read his every kindled, and stepping to the dock he began

the words to Webster. As he read his eyes kindled, and stepping to the desk he began writing the notes. Taking his violin, he played the melody and then jotted down the notes of the chorus. It was not over thirty minutes from the time I took my pen to write the words before two friends with Webster and myself were singing the hymn.

There's a land that is fairer than day, And By faith we can see it a - far. For the Father waits over the way,

To prepare us a dwelling place there. We shall sing on that beautiful shore The melodious songs of the blest;

And our spirits shall sorrow no more -

Not a sigh for the blessing of rest.

To our bountiful Father above We will offer our tribute of praise, For the glorious gift of His love, And the blessings that hallow our days.
